Operation HEART Helping Afghan Resettlement in Terre Haute

In welcoming the forgotten and marginalized - "the least of these" - we can answer the call of Matthew 25.

Afghan families are coming to Terre Haute, through Operation HEART (Helping Afghan Resettlement in Terre Haute), a local project working with Church World Service. By February 15, four families are expected to arrive here to start new lives. Central is one of a dozen local congregations involved in Operation HEART with Mike Riggins and Andrew Conner helping lead the newly-established non-profit.

How can you help? To furnish four homes, we need: Furniture & Household items:

<u>Preferred New:</u> Drying racks for dishes, brooms w/ dustpan, mops, pillows, 4 large living room rugs

New or Gently Used couches and beds in good condition, kitchen tables and chairs, rice cookers, dishes, cooking utensils, electric tea kettles, can openers, cutting boards, large & small trash cans, dish cloths and towels, cookware, silverware, mixing bowls, baking sheets, measuring cups and spoons, fancy serving dishes bath & hand towels, laundry room, bedding, vacuum cleaners, laundry baskets, umbrellas, clothes hangers etc.

Non-perishable groceries for their pantries (from the Taj Mahal restaurant on S. 3rd Street) See the list in fellowship hall.

New Toiletry items: Razors and shaving cream, trash bags, feminine hygiene items, shampoo, soap, toilet paper, sponges/rags, toothpaste, toothbrushes, paper towels, KN95 face masks etc...

Financial donations are being accepted to help with rent, utilities, clothing, and transportation. Mark gifts for "HEART" or "Afghans"

We have opportunities in the days and months ahead for volunteers to help with ESL, furniture moving and apartment set-up with donated items, financial mentors, drivers, medical and education advocates, fundraising, and orientation to American society and culture.

A NOTE FROM PASTOR MIKE RIGGINS

As of this writing all 92 Indiana counties are in the red on the state COVID dashboard. While there is some evidence that the expected peak of Omicron-variant cases has arrived, we expect to stay red for at least a few more weeks.

Never has the church been more important than right now. COVID Fatigue is real and it is tough. We need the supportive fellowship of the Body of Christ as we battle through these times. I see and hear examples of Central folk reaching out to one another, and especially to the shut-ins among us. I urge that we try to make even more of these gracious efforts. Make that phone call, send that card or text, express support for whatever decisions individuals and households have made about how present and public they choose to be.

When Vigo County goes yellow for two consecutive weeks we can re-open our ministries. Until then, worship with masks and certain other mitigations is our sole in-person program. I know that Zoom Fatigue is also a real thing. But perhaps for the short term we can participate more often in our virtual communities, like the Highpoint youth group and the Bible Study and Brew group. I find real encouragement in these; the smiling faces that pop up on my screen honestly improve my mood. Of course I look forward to going back to the brew pub--and taking my very sociable dog with me while the crazy one stays home with "Mama". But until that can happen I receive solace and support from my church community.

Sunday School Updates - In Person Sunday School for all ages has been paused since January 9 due to Vigo County's Red COVID status and in accordance with church policies. Ellie, Pastor Mike and our Sunday School teachers have been in communication with each other and with our children and families to offer support and some resources to stay connected even while we cannot meet in person. We are hopeful that it will be safe to gather again soon and that we will be able to resume our lessons and begin our adult class on sin led by Al Holder. I am also preparing teachings for all ages for the upcoming Lenten season and am preparing for in person, virtual and hybrid offerings if necessary.

2022 Lenten Series - Plans are underway to offer a lenten series at Central this year. We would meet on Sunday March 6, 13, 20, 27 and April 3 in the evening. There will be offerings for all ages. While we hope to be able to gather in person, if we cannot, digital resources and virtual gatherings will be available to all who wish to take part.

Session Notes from January for the February Herald

Session met on January 12 to hear reports and conduct routine business. Highlights from the meeting appear below.

Featured Report: Worship Commission

Brad Bough explained the responsibilities of the commission to recruit liturgists, children's moment presenters, and ushers, prepare elements, place appropriate sanctuary hangings, and guide worship. There have been a number of adjustments to our worship over the last year as conditions change. Staffing the commission as well as staffing the worship activities has been a challenge. Outdoor worship in Deming Park was a positive experience and the commission will consider whether to continue it occasionally when warm weather returns.

Pastor's Report:

Several items were raised for consideration and action.

- -As chief of staff he has begun the process of the staff's annual performance review.
- -We have not yet been matched with Afghan families by Exodus International but there are indications it may happen soon. The local group has incorporated as a not-for-profit and has a bank account. They are starting to collect both funds and household items and have found translators for two of the three languages the refugees commonly speak. Thanks to Andrew Conner for stepping in to assume a leadership role with the project.

Treasurer's Report: Our 2021 year to date surplus is \$25,666, helped in part by reduced expenses during the year. Yearend processing to the operating fund has been done, transferring unused continuing education to its fund and the final surplus to cumulative maintenance.

These transfers are not reflected in the numbers below. In addition, investments have been marked to yearend market values and dividends have been distributed to fund assets accordingly. Although financial secretary Sarah Kelsheimer is not in the office, she is highly involved with the work.

Per Capita payments

Every Presbyterian congregation has the opportunity to pay an annual per capita assessment to the denomination. Central Presbyterian, maintaining its traditional support for the PC(USA) to which we belong, makes this payment in full. We ask every member prayerfully to consider making an additional contribution--over and above your offering pledges--to cover this expense for our church. In 2022 the amount is \$46 per active member. You will find a special envelope in your offering boxes for this purpose.

A REMINDER OF THE CPC COVID GUIDELINES

Because of the growing number of COVID-19 cases reported, it is becoming increasingly likely that even fully vaccinated, apparently healthy individuals are carrying the virus. While they may be asymptomatic or have only very mild symptoms, they are still capable of passing the virus to others. We therefore propose we take steps to minimize the rate of re-infection that are consistent with the apparent viral load that is in the local community. We have, for our ready reference, an indication of the local viral load as manifested by the number of COVID cases in our county; the Indiana COVID19 Dashboard and Advisory Map. At the same time, we recognize that the high vaccination rate in the church community is helping to keep the viral load low within the church building.

When Vigo County is:

- Blue conditions Normal services without restriction.
- Yellow Normal services without restriction, masking and distancing would be recommended.
- Orange Masking required, distancing strongly recommended. Choir and other music subject to the individual participants comfort level.
- Red Masking and distancing required, suspension of choir and children's school/worship (children to remain with parents and not go forward for children's moment)
