CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT – Ellie Templeton, Christian Educator

In these uncertain times, we were overjoyed to be able to bring the children together and celebrate the birth of our Savior! Also thank you to Bruce McLaren and Alan Harder for their assistance making sure our video and sound setup was in place. An extra special thank you to the Guell family and baby Jack Salmeron (son of Katie Guell Salmeron) who joined us all the way from Kentucky and played the role of baby Jesus beautifully.





Sunday School Updates - Sunday School for all ages will resume on Sunday, January 2nd. We will be offering a new four week class led by Pastor Mike for adults. The class will discuss Luke the Storyteller: How the Gospel of Luke gets in our heads. This class will study the man Luke, the structure of his Gospel, how it fits with the Book of Acts, and how many of the stories we know about Jesus appear only in Luke. Following this Al Holder will be leading a class on sin that will commence on Sunday, January 30 and go through the Lenten season wrapping up on Palm Sunday. Notes on the class:

Jesus commanded those whom he helped to sin no more, see John 5:14 and 8:11, but working toward this goal is a tall, tall order. For what exactly is sin, and how do we possibly avoid it in our fallen state? Scriptural references and theological studies, which often differ in their interpretations, make it difficult to be certain about what is, and is not, sin. We will examine a new characteristic of sin each week by reading scripture and theological perspectives, followed by a conversation to share our thoughts. We will end on Palm Sunday and await the amazing grace of our Lord, who died for our sins on Good Friday and who rose on Easter to prove the greatest of all clemencies. Everyone is welcome, and no previous knowledge or forethought is needed. Come for a few or attend them all, just know that you are invited and that differing opinions will be respected and appreciated. Masks will be required to help keep us as safe as possible as we gather to contemplate the great mystery that is our faith.

Session Notes from December for the January Herald

Session conducted its stated meeting on December 8 to hear reports and transact business. A summary of actions follows.

Featured Report: Interpretation and Support Committee

Michael Shaw explained that the duties of the committee are to develop the annual stewardship campaign and assist in developing the budget. They choose campaign materials, review budget requests, and develop a preliminary budget based on these requests and cost estimates. As pledges come in, they continue to work to develop a balanced budget. Treasurer Bruce McLaren summarized the work that led to a 2022 budget of approximately \$311,000. Local benevolence is about the same, allocations for the cantata and scholarship singers have been reinstated, minimum hourly wages are at \$15.00, and salaries are increased by 4%. A motion to accept the budget as proposed and forward it to the congregation for action at the January congregational meeting was made and approved. Session approved the pastor's 2022 housing/ salary distribution as follows:

<u>Compensation/Terms of Call of Pastor Mike Riggins: \$34,766 salary; \$37,000 housing allowance; \$26,533 pen-</u> sion and medical insurance; up to \$2000 reimbursement for continuing education and professional expenses; up to \$500 reimbursement at IRS rate for church-related personal automobile usage; \$540 parking fringe benefit; vacation, 4 weeks (including 4 Sundays); study leave, 2 weeks (including 2 Sundays); sick leave, 5 days.

Pastor's Report:

Several issues were raised for consideration and action.

The Afghan resettlement initiative is proceeding. A motion for Central Presbyterian to support Afghan resettlement in the amount of \$2000 (with \$1000 from the mission fund and \$1000 from the session discretionary fund) was made and approved.

New member classes will be done via video and new members will meet with session in January.

Staff performance reviews will be done in January and February.

Church Life: According to our adopted policies, as long as Vigo County's Covid status remains orange we will not have coffee hour or other events with shared food.

Facilities: The warming oven has been repaired as have the brake lights for the bus.

Mission: Committee members distributed local benevolence checks in person to recipients.

Nominating: Judy Duffy presented the full slate of elders and deacons, and session thanked the committee for its timely work.

Per Capita payments

Every Presbyterian congregation has the opportunity to pay an annual per capita assessment to the denomination. Central Presbyterian, maintaining its traditional support for the PC(USA) to which we belong, makes this payment in full. We ask every member prayerfully to consider making an additional contribution--over and above your offering pledges--to cover this expense for our church. In 2022 the amount is \$46 per active member. You will find a special envelope in your offering boxes for this purpose.

A REMINDER OF THE CPC COVID GUIDELINES

Because of the growing number of COVID-19 cases reported, it is becoming increasingly likely that even fully vaccinated, apparently healthy individuals are carrying the virus. While they may be asymptomatic or have only very mild symptoms, they are still capable of passing the virus to others. We therefore propose we take steps to minimize the rate of re-infection that are consistent with the apparent viral load that is in the local community. We have, for our ready reference, an indication of the local viral load as manifested by the number of COVID cases in our county; the Indiana COVID19 Dashboard and Advisory Map. At the same time, we recognize that the high vaccination rate in the church community is helping to keep the viral load low within the church building.

When Vigo County is:

- Blue conditions Normal services without restriction.
- Yellow Normal services without restriction, masking and distancing would be recommended.
- Orange Masking required, distancing strongly recommended. Choir and other music subject to the individual participants comfort level.
- Red Masking and distancing required, suspension of choir and children's school/worship (children to remain with parents and not go forward for children's moment)
