




This coming Sunday we will celebrate communion in unity with Christians of all types, around the world. The Ecumenical Movement of the midtwentieth century conceived of this show of unity. It is particularly meaningful to me when I consider my own extended families, whose Lutheran and Catholic Churches will join in the ob-

servance.

We Presbyterians will also have the opportunity to contribute to the Peace and Global Witness special offering. Twenty-five percent of what we give stay with us. Our Mission Committee will recommend to the session how we will distribute it. Twenty-five percent will go to the Presbytery of Ohio Valley, whose Mission Committee will make its own recommendations. I understand one proposal works for reconciliation in communities that have experienced unrest around the resettlement of Afghanis in them. (Praise God, I know of no such incidents here in Terre Haute.) The remaining half of our gifts go to the work of the Presbyterian national Mission Agency. They will use it to support their work across this nation and around the world. I urge all of us to consider making an offering to this cause.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws Presbyterians together and provides education and exposure to those who show us how to do peacemaking well. It allows us to create resources for dealing with conflict and provide nurturing reconciliation, and stand in support of our global sisters and brothers, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere.

This is why we give to the Peace & Global Witness offering. We give because we know that every level of society is in need of Christ's peace – at all times, in all ways. From our congregation, where we retain 25 percent of this offering ; to the region, where 25 percent is retained by mid councils

to support peacemaking efforts being pursued, together with our neighboring congregations; and to the ends of the earth, where the remaining 50 percent is deployed by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to join the peacemaking efforts of church partners all over the globe. We join these monetary gifts with our prayers for peace and our work for justice.

Session Notes from September for the October Herald

Session met on September 14 to hear reports and conduct routine business. Highlights from the meeting appear below.

Featured Report: Finance Commission

The Finance Commission written report was reviewed.

Pastor's Report:

The pastor's written report summarized his visit with David Montgomery, interim pastor at 1st Presbyterian Church of Bowling Green, OH. The report echoed his oral summary during the August 10 session meeting. He emphasized his unequivocal support for the decision to publish both internally and externally our acceptance of persons of all genders and expressions. He also summarized recent activity in transporting what may be our final Afghan refugee, and reuniting him with his family, already situated in Terre Haute.

Treasurer's Report:

Beth Christ, filling in for Bruce McLaren, reported that August income was up. She also noted that because of the complexity and workload involved with the treasurer's duties, we may, in the future, need to consider a compensated position for those functions.

Christian Educator's Report:

Ellie Templeton reported that the fall Sunday School classes are going well, thanks to teachers and the kickoff activities. Tim has the youth program off and running with sufficient volunteers. Among future events are the presbytery-wide retreat at PYOCA in November, and a partnership with Jeff Moles' youth group from Owensboro. The current staff of nursery workers is proving reliable, and Ellie is recruiting additional workers for backups and extra duties as Tuesday committee meetings get underway.

Reports and Action Items from Committees and Commissions:

Christian Nurture: Tuesday night meals hosts are now scheduled through March 2023: September Church Life; October Mission; November Finance; January Facilities; February Worship; March Christian Nurture.

Worship: Worship is working to rebuild usher teams now that attendance is returning. The resumption of presenting the "gifts of worship" (Bible, paten and cup, and baptismal water) will resume when usher teams are formed. Ellie will explore a youth usher team with Central youth.

Mission: Andrew Conner reported on Operation Heart. The 4th family that was scheduled to arrive is not coming after all, and no more Afghan refugees are anticipated. Operation Heart has one unoccupied house, and will maintain it through the end of the contract. The families that remain in Terre Haute have exhausted their sponsored support. (90 days were allotted.) Informal support such as assistance in obtaining work permits, community orientation, etc, will continue through January.

Time to Move and Shake again!

Passing the Peace—Almost 2000 years of liturgical connection.

With the easing of Covid protocols, the Worship Commission has modified advice on avoiding personal contact during "Passing the Peace." It's OK, *as personal comfort dictates*, to move about the sanctuary to greet fellow worshipers, shake hands, fist bump, elbow bump or simply wave.

But why do we do it at all?!? Those of us "rich in decades" can remember that it wasn't included in our earlier years. In fact, though, it's been around in varying forms since the founding of the church!

"The Peace originated in the practice of the early Christians, who were accustomed to exchanging a "holy kiss" during the liturgy."* (Romans 16:16 Greet one another with a holy kiss.) It signified full acceptance, and the egalitarian character of Christians.

We use it now after the prayer of confession and assurance of pardon to celebrate our reconciliation to God by offering reconciling words and gestures to each other as people of God.
