Session Notes from May for the June Herald

Session met on May 14 to hear reports and conduct business. Highlights from the meeting appear below.

Featured Report: Facilities Commission: An updated appraisal for insurance purposes will occur in June and will be reviewed with our carrier. A problem with our alarm system was caused by a power issue with Duke Energy. Koorsen, the alarm company, replaced the battery backup for the key card lock on the south door and found an issue with the north door that will be corrected. The sump pump below the pantry is doing its job but the deteriorating mortar lets outside water wick in and affect the floor joists. The commission is gathering information for repair. Sycamore Engineering has done their annual maintenance on the HVAC system. They found one issue and will recheck it in the fall.

Christian Educator's Report: The Sunday School year is wrapping up and plans are underway for VBS, which will begin June 3. Ten children, from a wide age range, are attending camp at Pyoca this summer. The church pays half of their cost, and this exceeds the camps and conferences budget by \$1220. Session approved a motion to use the McKee funding to cover the budget shortfall.

Reports and Action Items from Committees and Commissions:

Worship: David Nwalado's concert is this Sunday and will be followed by a reception. Alan Harder moved that we authorize collection of a free will offering for the Music Fund and the motion was approved. The pulpit Bible was repaired, at no charge, through the ISU library's special collections department.

Mission: The bulletin board system for donations for the Lotus Center is working well and donations are coming in. The committee moved that \$1500 of the local benevolence budget be sent to Manna from Seven and the motion was approved.

Nominating: Steve Mead reported that the committee had inadvertently left off the name of Phil Farmer from the list of incoming elders. On behalf of the committee, he asked session to authorize a congregational meeting to elect Phil to a one-year term (class of 2026). Session approved the motion to call a congregational meeting for this purpose at the earliest time possible.

Session notes (continued)

Commissioner to Presbytery: Alan Harder announced that a meeting will be held next week and changes to the Book of Order will be considered. He believes the most impactful of these is consideration of exchanging clergy with the Episcopal church.

Other Business: Alan Finnan noted that we will begin discussions about interim ministry next month; processes have changed since our last interim search. Pulpit supply for the next four Sundays was reviewed and a question about compensation was referred to the Worship commission.

Handrails were installed in the sanctuary along the front steps, and some sort of railing may be installed along the north steps.

McKee Family Scholarship - The Nancy and Dale McKee Family Scholarship is given through the Wabash Valley Community Foundation. Surrell Scholarships – The Surrell Scholarship Fund was established from a bequest from Mary E. Surrell who became a member of Central in 1866. The Christian Nurture Commission oversees this process.
